THE PULLMAN EFFECT

Ever since the beginning of mass tourism, people have wanted someone to tell them where to go. For the last 23 years, hundreds of thousands of Americans have followed the advice of a travel writer named Rick Pullman. Pullman, the author of 25 travel guides, is the leading authority for American tourists looking for quiet, unspoiled vacation sites in Europe.

- 5 Kate Harrison, a typical Pullman fan, was interested in a vacation far from the tourist crowd. She and her family were enchanted by Pullman's description of Gimmelwald, a tiny village in the Swiss Alps with incredible views and no cars. Pullman, an unusually gifted travel writer, reviews places like Gimmelwald in a style which is often funny and always charming.

Maybe too charming. Each year, the 140 villagers of Gimmelwald brace themselves for a
10 flood of about 18,000 Americans. "In the beginning, we were worried about having all these tourists here." Says Heidi Berger, who runs a small local hotel. "Now we're used to it, and do our best to make them feel at home."

One reason the invasion seems more bearable is Pullman's unique philosophy of tourism, which could be summarized as: Be positive. If something's not to your liking, change your
15 liking. That's not the attitude you'd expect from the stereotypical tourist, but it is representative of those who arrive holding Pullman's guidebook. "We are a quiet farming community," says Berger, "and our visitors respect our way of life." Berger also noted with satisfaction the effect on the local economy, adding that Pullman is responsible for some 90% of her own business.

- 20 Pullman is aware that when his readers follow his advice these days, they are likely to find other tourists rather than the peace and quiet they are looking for. But he has no regrets. "So many more Americans are now immersing themselves in foreign cultures," he says. "I'm proud to take credit for that." The locals are not complaining either. In fact, with income from tourism expected to drop some 20% this summer, many European destinations would
- 25 not doubt wish for a bit more of the Pullman effect.
